Angel Kanchev's Suicide Reflected in the Bulgarian Newspapers in 1872

On March 5th 1872, at the Ruse port Angel Kanchev, one of the most faithful allies of Vassil Levski, committed suicide. The news about the tragic event spread quickly and was the reason for lots of comments and speculations, which were voiced on the pages of the 1872 Bulgarian Newspapers. According to their own interests the newspapers defended different points of view. The bold and biting publications in "The Liberty" - an issue of The Bulgarian Revolutionary General Committee in Bucharest, supported the betrayal version, openly branding the betrayers. The regional newspaper "The Danube" took a contrary stand and covered the event from its own perspective. The suicide of the twenty-one-year old revolutionary was for a long time commented in the then revival press which proved how significant the event was.
